

Montana Soil Health Symposium-

The Montana Soil Health Symposium was on February 8-9th this year in Billings. It brought together national and local speakers to discuss soil health techniques and innovations. Adding to these speakers were 15 Montana producers covering topics relevant to farmers, ranchers, and gardeners—properties of all sizes--working to produce healthy, nutritious foods

using soil health principles. Over 400 people attended from all across Montana and other states. The Lewis and Clark Conservation District attended along with our NRCS partners. We enjoyed 2 days of learning all about the soil health principles and regenerative agriculture. Having the option to attend several different breakout sessions on various topics we were able to tailor the symposium to our specific interests. We tried to mix it up by each attending a different breakout session and then sharing what we learned with each other afterwards. The sessions covered all different topics but there was still the central theme of the importance of soil health.

One of the breakout sessions was "Gardening for Soil Health" where two different speakers shared examples of their no-dig gardens and how they got started. The first speaker shared how he went from a very small outside garden to using high-tunnels and being able to share his organic produce with his community. The second speaker shared how she uses her skills and knowledge to help other gardeners switch to regenerative techniques to preserve their soil so they can continue to grow beautiful gardens. Both speakers use the five soil health principles to maximize their garden's productivity while also improving the soil's health. These principles include 1.) Keep a living root in the soil 2.) Armor the soil 3.) Minimize disturbance 4.) Grow a diversity of plants 5.) Incorporate livestock. They also discussed a 6th principle which is "knowing the context" of the land and user. These principles bring farming, ranching, and gardening all together and allows the soil to become more effective at producing healthier foods. It's important that we start focusing more on these principles so we can conserve our soils for future generations.

Water Test Cost Share Program

The CD will reimburse landowners in Lewis and Clark County \$25 when they get their well water tested. Your first call should be to the Lewis and Clark County Water Quality Protection District at 406-457-8584 for recommendations on what tests would be best to run. They should also have test kits available from the Well-Educated program from MSU. Once you've gotten your results back, email a copy to us at

District Report-Chris Evans, District Administrator

The first quarter of 2023 has been a little crazy, having lost Connor Mertz, our Resource Technician, at the end of December. We are working on hiring, but in the meantime, our projects/programs are being run by District Administrator Chris Evans, and our Big Sky Watershed Corps member, Claudia Lyman.

In January, the CD participated in the Conservation District Awareness Day in the Rotunda during the legislative session, and CD administrator Chris Evans, and Chair Jeff Ryan both testified a number of times at the session.

In February, Chris Evans and Claudia Lyman attended the Soil Health Symposium in Billings. What a fabulous event, with a great variety of speakers on regenerative agriculture. We also had materials at the Montana Native Plant Society conference in Helena, and Vice Chair Karl Christians met with the East Helena High School Career Technical Education Advisory Council for the high school. Activities with the Helena CORE (Community of Resource Educators) started ramping up for the spring/summer/fall events as well, and CD staff were involved in those planning sessions.

Our district administrator, remains busy working with the state's CD Employee Organization as current president, as well as chairing the Montana Association of Conservation Districts Education Work Group, and assisting with both the Living on the Bank project and the Montana Joint Stream Restoration Committee. Chris and Claudia were busy in March preparing for the Pollinator Initiative events this spring.

CD Supervisors acted on 3 new permit applications in the first quarter, and finalized their budget and operations plan for 2023. Re-elected Supervisors were sworn in before the January board meeting.

In the next quarter, the CD will be doing a number of activities with the Rolling Rivers trailer, distributing pollinator seed in the Augusta and Lincoln areas, and working on a number of projects, including the 2023 Lake Helena Willow lift, with the aid of a grant from DNRC.

Pollinator Project 2023!

As part of a grant from DNRC, the Conservation Districts in our area are again participating in pollinator planting seed giveaways for 2023. There is limited seed and we will be requiring follow up monitoring by landowners as a part of the grant project.

Birdseye Area Agriculture Call for Planning Input

The Helena NRCS office is seeking input from active farming and ranching or other agricultural operations in the Birdseye area. Staff in the office are exploring the feasibility of a conservation project focused on providing agricultural producers in the area with technical and financial assistance to enhance their operations. Helpful feedback includes:

- Identification of resource concerns such as: livestock water limitations, invasive weed management, wind or water erosion, wildfire hazard, crop production limitations, etc.
 - Determination of useful assistance practices such as: livestock watering facilities, high tunnel systems, fuel breaks, fencing, noxious weed management, etc.
 - Recognition of potential partners and cooperators.

2023 SRWG PROJECT & PROGRAM UPDATE

In 2022, SRWG completed our DEQ-sponsored Watershed Restoration Plan. This plan describes our long-range plan to further our mission to *collaboratively protect and restore the resources of the Sun River watershed and its communities*, and to work on our strategic goals, which are to:

- o Improve water quality through reduction of sediment, nutrients, and temperature
- o Manage stream flows for all seasons and multiple uses
- o Restore hydrologic processes, such as floodplain connectivity and river migration
- o Enrich natural resources, such as soils, fish, and wildlife
- Control noxious weeds
- o Educate our communities about watershed resources and stewardship
- o Monitor and follow up on actions to measure project success

SRWG also recently completed the Muddy Creek Master Plan. Using this plan, in 2022 SRWG identified top-priority work that includes three miles of stream restoration and expansion of J-Wasteway, and applied for \$2.3M to complete this on-the-ground work. To date, \$1.769M has been awarded through a Reclamation WaterSMART grant and a \$500,000 grant proposal to DNRC is currently completing the approval process at the Montana State Legislature.

Other Projects: SRWG also installed a new stream gage on Muddy Creek near the town of Power, replacing the previous gage that washed out in 2018 and 2019. SRWG hosted many events and educational opportunities for our local communities. In 2022, that included our second Rain Barrel Workshop, which teaches the public about nonpoint source pollution and provides them each with a rain barrel so they can collect rain for watering their yard and garden. We also held our 24th annual Weed Whacker Rodeo and first ever Freezeout Lake Spent Ammo and Trash Cleanup. SRWG participated in the Great Falls Chamber of Commerce "Worlds of Work" event, encouraging 8th and 10th graders to consider studies and careers in natural resource science and conservation.

In addition:

- SRWG continues to monitor water quality at seven locations throughout the
 watershed. SRWG leads a Water Management Working Group that brings water
 managers and water users together twice a year to discuss water management,
 storage, weather, and stream gages across the watershed. The next working
 group meeting is April 20 at 10 am in Fairfield. Contact
 tracy@sunriverwatershed.org for more information.
- SRWG's River Conditions page is now live. This page includes a map of the watershed with links to real-time stream gages and water quality monitoring sites. The page will also display "hoot owl" closures by FWP and other recreation information and will eventually include reservoir heights as well: www.sunriverwatershed.org/river-conditions.
- **Weeds** are a key program for SRWG. SRWG participates in multiple programs to control weeds in the watershed.
- In 2023, SRWG will host our 25th annual Weed Whacker Rodeo (July 8), 2nd annual Freezout Lake Spent Ammo and Trash Cleanup (May 7), and multiple other events. We also hope to begin work on the Muddy Creek Restoration Phase I project this year, while continuing to pursue other project opportunities. In addition, SRWG has many more potential projects and events in planning
